James, unlike anyone I have ever seen, can sit in front of his own or someone else's empty space and not rush to try and fill it or fix it. He simply lives in it and through it.

James is a man who, in his own peculiar way, knows how to listen to his heart and calls others to do the same. I don't know if I'll be ready for Christmas by the time it gets here, but I do know that the season of Advent offers us an invitation to listen more deeply. I do know that God is moving in this world. And I do know that God deeply desires to be in conversation with all of us. May this season of Advent find all of us ready with listening spirits, a grateful heart, and empty spaces!



L'Arche International Assembly in 2012

Twice every decade, delegates from across the International Federation of L'Arche come together to share, listen and debate in order to guide the global L'Arche movement towards the future. Following gatherings in Assisi, Italy and Kolkata, India, the next International Assembly will be held in Atlanta, USA from June 1st to June 10th, 2012.

This weeklong meeting of 500 participants from about 40 countries will take place at the Agnes Scott College in Decatur, Georgia, just outside Atlanta. Each L'Arche community from across the globe will send a delegate to the Assembly. The delegate selected for L'Arche Tahoma Hope is Teresa Hershberger. Teresa is in her third year at L'Arche and is House Leader at Anawim. Leana Shiu, core member at Anawim and worker at Farm & Gardens, will be one of five people with intellectual disabilities from our region and one of 100 from across the world who will also be participating in the Assembly.

International Assemblies have always been an experience of various languages, religions and cultures, of encounter, celebration, work and discovery. Whether lived on-site at the Agnes Scott College in Decatur or at home through videos, newsletters and prayer, the week in Atlanta will strengthen the network of L'Arche communities.

The International General Assembly '12 will mark an important time of transition for the Federation: we will give thanks to the outgoing international coordinators and celebrate what has been accomplished in the past 13 years. The management of the Federation since Kolkata '08 will be reviewed. The Assembly will also adopt a new international mandate, appoint the new leadership and Board, decide on a new constitution, and determine directions for commitment and belonging.

The gathering is a possibility to extend L'Arche's values and vision to Atlanta. This week is an opportunity to learn about and from a local culture, in this case, the USA and, more specifically, the American South. From June 1st to June 3rd, delegates will get the chance to make friends with people from Atlanta. Atlantans

On June 8th, participants will live a community day involving interaction with people and places in Atlanta, the birthplace of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Last but not least, Atlanta '12 shall be a learning experience on how women and men with and without disabilities can contribute fully to such a meeting. As such, the gathering will be a reminder to L'Arche and our societies that the disability rights movement leading towards the Americans with Disabilities Act is an ongoing call to action everywhere in the world.


L'Arche Jumps Into Local Pools

we carefully wheel, walk, and climb the ladders into the pool, but we're diving into healthy and enjoyable play time.




